The Ben and Wendi Letourneau family moved to Beloit in 2010, where Ben assumed the position of Natural Resources District Conservationist for Mitchell County. Ben and Wendi have eight children ranging from a freshman in high school to three years old. In 2015, he instituted the inaugural year of the Cross Country program at St. John's. In four short years, two State Champion teams and two 3rd in State men's teams are visible statements of success.





Rusty Lueger assumed the coaching duties of Scholars Bowl in 2010. Rusty joined our St. John's family in 2010 as a young, single man! Ten years later, he is married to Gina and they have five very active and engaged future Blujays (with a 6th on the way)! Under his guidance, since 2014, the Scholars Bowl team has achieved two State Championships, two 3rd place finishes and one 5th place finish. Rusty also guides the students in the Fort Hays State Math Relays. This annual competition is host for upwards of 40 schools (600+ students), 1A - 6A, competing amongst themselves for the top individual and team positions. For 9 consecutive years, the Blujays have dominated the 1A Division. And, the last 2 years, St. John's outpaced all schools, regardless of class. Quite impressive . . .

Even with the evident success of both programs, the best years of the cross country, scholars bowl and Math Relays teams at St. John's are most likely in the future! It is fun to sense and observe the

enthusiasm and eagerness within the younger student body to build upon the groundbreaking triumphs of their older mentors! Stay tuned for future accomplishments!

All well and good with the success on the cross country trails and scholars bowl classrooms . . . And we, as a Catholic school, continue to daily mentor and form students with the virtues and characteristics inherent to our mission. St. John's could not be more thankful of the roles Rusty and Ben play, assisting in the process to steer our young men and women towards heaven.

BEES!

St. John's received a grant through Solomon Valley Community Foundation to start two bee hives. Joe Holdren picked up the bees from the Golden Prairie Honey Farm in Manhattan, Kansas. He and his wife, Marci, went through a boot camp there earlier this year to learn the basics of beekeeping.

The bees were introduced to the hives the last week in March, so the adventure has just begun. Joe was planning on doing this project with the environment class, but with the school year ending with online classes, it will be difficult to be hands on. He posted a short video on YouTube with an introduction in order to try and keep them involved. Hopefully as spring progresses, they can meet on a small group level and the students can become more involved in the project.

Joe said, "We are hoping if we are successful and getting the bees going in a healthy hive, and honey is produced, that we can sell it locally for a science room fundraiser for future equipment needed."





Student Spotlight

Landon Eilert, son of Allen and Tammy Eilert and a senior at St. John's, was honored for his exemplary volunteer service with a President's Volunteer Service Award.

The award, which recognizes Americans of all ages who have volunteered significant amounts of their time to serve their communities and country, was granted by The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards Program. Landon was nominated by St. John's for national honors this fall in recognition of his volunteer service activities.

Landon has shared his time and talents in a number of ways throughout high school for his school, parish and community. Some highlights from his application that garnered national attention include using his musical talents of singing and playing the banjo and baritone. Landon has entertained with his banjo at area nursing homes, during Beloit's Millapalooza, through school Praise and Worship events and on a national stage at the National Catholic Youth Conference in Indianapolis last fall. He also provides baritone lessons to younger students on his own time.

Landon intends to major in video production next year at Hutchinson Community College. He has spent countless hours as a videographer for St. John's basketball teams, and also produced various video projects for the parish as a student in the media class (investing significant time outside of class to make the projects a success).



Landon was also previously named one of 1,928 Coca-Cola Scholarship Foundation semi-finalists out of more than 93,000 applicants. He was one of only 20 students from Kansas high schools selected for that honor.

This past year I received the gift of joining Regnum Christi (RC), which is Latin for "Kingdom of Christ." RC is a Movement within the Church under the mission of the Roman Catholic Church. In short, we are on a mission to build the kingdom of Christ. One of the ways RC builds the kingdom is through the Regnum Christi Mission Corps (RCMC). As missionaries, we are placed based on where the core team thinks we will grow the most. I was so blessed to be able to go to the Philippines! Three young women and I were welcomed into Everest Academy, an RC school in Manila. I was placed in the lower school, specifically third through fifth grade. I helped lead the student's Catholic Formation during school and at after-school clubs. I also had the opportunity to work in the high school, college Bible studies, and Mano Amiga formation (for those living in poverty). It's safe to say I kept busy!

One of the things that impacted my Catholic faith was living with Consecrated women. Working, eating, and praying with them daily was such a gift. The joy carried on their faces is evidence of the love God has placed in their hearts through prayer. I hope to live by following their example of joy! When the Spanish arrived in the Philippines in the sixteenth century, they brought their faith with them, colonizing and sharing Catholic beliefs. This influence affected the daily lives of Filipinos then, and it still does now. Filipinos have made the faith their own and now more than ever, the Church is alive.

33RD ANNUAL ST. JOHN'S SCHOOLS BENEFIT AUCTION



"A Night with the Stars...Saints and Heroes" was the theme of the 2020 St. John's School Auction held on Saturday, March 21st. This was the 33rd consecutive year for the event, but it looked very different this year. With less than a weeks notice, the auction went from being a large social event to completely online and remote event. In total, over 500 supporters raised \$181,000 to go to the school! There were 780 items and \$36,885 in cash donated. All of these were record highs for the event. We were so fortunate to work with Luke Hansen of Hansen Reality and Auction who provided the auctioneering services and all the background labor. Also, a special thanks to the St. John's School Council, auction solicitors, and the individuals who stepped up to make the quick transition to an online auction. \$58,800 was raised for the "Calm the Seas" fund that will help the school confront the challenges ahead during this time of uncertainty. Thank you supporters!

But, the thing I missed the most while being gone was definitely my family! It's always been difficult to be away from them, so many months at a time was a challenge. I also missed living in a small town. Manila is the capital of the Philippines, and it sure is busy! I missed little things like the stars, quiet nights, and seeing familiar faces. That said, when God asks one to be generous, He is generous in return. I experienced God's consolation through the love of those I was serving, the Consecrated, my missionary sisters, and a sincere prayer life.


